

Finishing Bee



Every quilter has them: UFOs— UnFinished Objects taking up physical space in the sewing room and mental space that most busy quilters can ill afford to spare.

Do you suffer from Quilter's Attention Deficit Disorder? Read on if you can relate:



My UFO "stash" is out of control. Quite honestly, I have no business starting any new projects....EVER. I could work out of my UFO stash for years.

Last January, intending to join the Finishing Bee, and because I was moving and just wanted to see how bad it was, I 77. So far, I have actually finished wrote down all of my quilting projects in whatever stage of progress. There were and completed a few more guilt tops to 62. That I could count. This did NOT include other sewing projects such as pincushions, skirts, aprons, bags, etc., or any of my daughters' UFOs. Then I actually color-coded my list: BLUE = Quilt Top Finished, (waiting for the quilter... ME!) GREEN = Some Piecing/ Appliqué completed PURPLE = Fabrics/ pattern assembled into a kit, and BROWN = I have a pattern or a plan...

And then I didn't "officially" join the Finishing Bee because I knew that as soon as I picked my top 10, it would change on a weekly basis... If I start a new project, I can almost guarantee I won't finish it before something else catches my eye! I think I may have quilter's ADD. I can't help it! I want to make everything!

Ten months later, my list has grown to EIGHT of my UFOs (do a little dance!), add to the pile for a total of 19. (OK, to me, there are several phases of DONE...) I realized that the 18 kits I have assembled don't really count as UFOs, because I haven't actually started those yet. And, I am just THINKING about nine more projects, which don't really count either, so that leaves 23 Un-Finished Opportunities. Now that seems manageable, doesn't it? Do I really suffer from a disease? Is there a cure? The best cure, of course, is quilting with friends! Now, where did I put that cut list for the Mystery Quilt?!? Oh-make that 78.....

Sew... you want to bee a Quilter...



Do you make it a practice to ensure that your sewing machine performs at its best? A little machine maintenance can save you hours of frustration.

- 1. NEVER sew over needles and pins.
- 2. Change the needle with every new project.
- 3. Clean dust bunnies from under the throat plate on a regular basis.
- 4. Oil as recommended, and NEVER use oil that has turned brown.
- Attend classes on the care and maintenance of your specific machine, if possible.
- If you use a computer-based machine, ALWAYS use a surge protector. (Note that not all electrical strips have this feature).
- 7. Sew with good-quality thread.
- 8. When traveling by car with your machine, strap the machine in, or set it on the floor behind the front seat.
- 9. Last but not least, take your machine in for its annual check-up.


