Finishing Bee

Every quilter has them: UFOs— UnFinished Objects taking up physical space in the sewing room and mental space that most busy quilters can ill afford to spare. It seems that guilters are so anxious to learn the next technique, that they are ready to move on to another project before the current one is finished. In this column look for tips to help you transform UFOs from clutter that only gathers dust into treasures that gather memories.

Decide You Really Want the UFOs Finished

The first essential in finishing your UFOs is feeling a genuine urgency to get them done. Be honest with yourself about this. Maybe designing, piecing, or appliqué are the things you really love about quilting. Maybe, deep down inside, the basting, quilting, and binding don't interest you all that much. If that's the case, it might make more sense to find someone else who really loves finishing quilts to complete your UFOs.

You could offer to swap tasks with another quilter who doesn't like piecing, or pick up some extra cash by selling your tops on EBay to someone who will enjoy finishing them, or donate them to a charity group that will make sure they get to people who need them. If you decide you really want to finish them yourself, well, that's where the "Finishing Bee" comes in.

A "fat quarter" is NOT an anatomical part…

Sew... you want to bee a Quilter...

A "fat quarter" is not an anatomical part... no, not a result of amassed cellulite, just a handkerchief-sized square of fabric. Fabric is sold by the running yard. A quarter-yard of fabric is long and skinny (9" x 44"). Fabric stores usually cut a half-yard of fabric, and then cut the half-yard in two. The resultant quarter-yard pieces are short and fat (18" x 22"), hence the name Fat Quarter. These cuts are a much more functional piece of fabric, offering more versatility, whether for patchwork or appliqué.

Fat Quarters are addictive. Once you have some, you must have more. Quilt Shops feed the need with beautiful selections of pre-cut, pre-folded fat quarters in bins or on shelves. They are like glistening jewels, beckoning, calling to you. And so the stash begins to build....

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
Round Robin Bee

March: Round 1—Bring your Center Block for the initial exchange. Receive someone else's block to add the first border.

April: Round 2—Return Round 1 block with first border added, give to Cat to exchange for someone else's.

May: Round 3—Return Round 2 quilt with second border added; exchange again. This time you will have two months to add the final border—no RR Bee

in June due to Guild Retreat.
