


## A Preview ~ Quilting Bee

### Finishing Bee



Every quilter has them: UFOs— UnFinished Objects taking up physical space in the sewing room and mental space that most busy quilters can ill afford to spare.

Here are MORE TIPS to help revive and conquer those projects you originally approached with such enthusiasm.

1. Set a timer. Work 20 minutes on an old project before moving on to your latest work-in-progress. Before you know it, you'll have "jumped the hurdle."
2. Keep it limited. Don't worry about continuing with lots more piecing. Add a wide border, or scale the piece down from a queen-sized quilt to twin or lap size.
3. Donate your work. Many organizations are on the lookout for small quilts to give as comfort blankets to children in need. A finished quilt top will be welcomed with open arms.
4. Begin a Round Robin with a group of quilting friends. Sometimes it just takes a new set of eyes to bring a previously cast-off UFO to life.
5. Make it a gift. Do you need a quick baby or office gift? By adding a few extra touches (e.g., prairie points, borders, sashing) you can whip up a gift in no time.
6. If all else fails, put your UFO up for sale on eBay. You may be able to recoup some of your "investment."

## Sew... you want to be a Quilter...



Every quilter needs a space to design and lay out a quilt, or a place to post the current project where she can see it and make changes.

A design wall can be made by covering a large 4' x 8' sheet of foam board or sound board with flannel, felt or fleece. The large sheets of foam board and sound board are available for purchase at home center supply stores. Two sheets of board would give you an eight foot square design wall. If space is available in your studio, a design wall large enough for a full size quilt is very helpful.

Another alternative for a design wall would be to purchase a wide window shade, and cover it with flannel, felt or fleece using a spray adhesive. Then install it over a wide door or window. This can be pulled down and used as a design wall -- then rolled back up to be out of the way when not needed. Your quilt pieces will remain on the wall when rolled because the back side of the window shade would be smooth and not attract the fabric pieces. But be sure to roll the shade down and up carefully so the quilt pieces don't fly in all directions.

A favorite portable design wall for taking your project to a retreat or a class can be an inexpensive plastic flannel-backed tablecloth (in a plain color). Pin it to the wall or simply lay it out on the floor or a bed--flannel side up. When you are finished for the day, just roll it up and tuck it away until next time. This little portable design wall is great to take your project to a class or retreat.

As you piece a block or partial block units place them on the design wall. Move them around. View them through reversed binoculars, or a camera viewer, a reducing glass (opposite of a magnifying glass), or purchase a door peephole (about \$5) from a home center or hardware store.
