Quilts should be at least $40'' \times 60''$, tied or quilted then labeled. They will also accept fleece blankets .

COOL TOOL


Quilter's Rule QUICK QUARTER

Use this simple little ruler to mark your fabric for quick half— or quartersquare triangle piecing without cutting or piecing triangles!

To make two half-square triangle units, stack two squares of fabric; one light, one dark, then use a mechanical pencil to mark the diagonal line down the middle of the ruler, and on both sides of the ruler

which are a scant 1/4-inch away from the center line. Stitch on those lines and cut down the center to produce two half-square triangles. Press toward the dark. Layer these units, alternating light and dark, mark, stitch and cut as before to create two quarter-square triangle units.

This marking guide is available in two lengths—12" and 8". A great tool to divide squares. Available locally at Seasons of Home.
