I was born and raised in Jackson, Wyoming. My childhood was spent on one of the most beautiful ranches in Jackson Hole, where my dad was a ranch foreman. He taught me everything that had to with the out-of-doors: fencebuilding, heavy equipment operation, horseback-riding, cow punching and on and on. My mother taught my older sister and I to sew in 4-H.

I married a man from a rival school. His mother was distressed that he was "marrying a wild Jackson girl." That was 40 years ago. We have three children, a son and two daughters. My family describes me as a person that will try most anything and who has the ability to make a silk purse out of a

sow's ear.

I love cycles, sewing, stained glass, leather work, carpentry, walking, animals and family. I have my master's degree in Social Work from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas where we lived for thirteen years prior to coming to Heber. My husband and I have owned and operated eighteen retail businesses in thirty years.

I became interested in quilting when I was about 10 years old. My greatgrandmother would come from California and stay with my grandmother. While great-grandma would visit she would have everyone cut or sort quilt blocks. As a young girl I

enjoyed being asked my opinion as to what material went best. My mother had handmade quilts on our beds and today she still has some of them. She has cut, sewed and embroidered many blocks for me. Then as my own children were married, I continued the quilting tradition and made each of them a hand-quilted and a tied quilt for their weddings.

My goal is to learn as many different techniques, shortcuts and tricks as I can. I made a paper-pieced quilt block this year and greatly enjoyed the challenge. I like quilts that are made of one kind of fabric-flannel, cotton, micro suede, wool, etc. Quilting to me is "sew" exciting and rewarding.

COOL TIP

Brenda's Tip of the Month: SQUARING YOUR QUILT

After quilting is the time to square your quilt. Wash your quilt in warm water with a high water level and a gentle cycle. Unless your quilt is soiled, you don't need detergent.

Cover a carpeted floor with several flat sheets or a mattress pad. Carefully remove the quilt from the washer, because the weight of the water in the quilt could cause the stitching to break.

Lay the quilt right side up on the sheets. Smooth out the quilt, making sure it is straight and flat.

Using a metal tape measure, measure the length of the quilt along the sides and down the center. If your edges are shorter than the center, stretch them to match the center. If the edges are longer than the center, ease them so they are the same measurement as the center.

Measure the width of the quilt along the sides and down the center. Ease or stretch the sides as needed to match the measurement at the center of the quilt.

Next, measure the quilt along each diagonal. If the two diagonal measurements match, then the quilt is square. If they don't match, then stretch a corner to make the shorter diagonal longer. Ease the quilt so that the corners look square.

Finally, go back and re-do all the measurements to make sure your quilt is now square. When it is, you can leave it to dry, perfectly square!
