DESIGN CHALLENGE Shantelle Cox

### IN REVIEW—2005 JULY GUILD MEETING

Shantelle Cox demonstrated ways to take the fear out of curved and set-in seams. With a few simple tools, she showed us how to take our sewing skills to a new level! In a curved seam, one side will have a concave edge, or "smile" shape, and the other is convex, or "pie" shaped. To prepare each piece, fold in half and cut a tiny notch in the center of the curve. Align the center notches and pin, with the smile shaped piece on the top. Use Roxanne's Glue Baste-It and put a small line of glue from the center to the end of the curve, about 1/2" in from the edge. Line up edges, curving the smile piece as you go. Pin in place. Repeat for the other side. Remove pins, and stitch using a 1/4" seam. Because the fabric is onthe bias, you will find that you will not need to pull or stretch as you sew. Press seam toward the pie piece, then square up the block beginning on the smile side of the block. Voila! Easy as pie!

The trick for beautiful set-in or "Y" seams is to mark the seam allowances prior to joining your seams. Use a sharp marking pencil, and accurately mark only the seams involved in the set-in seam. Seams are sewn to the spot where the two drawn lines intersect. Do not stitch through the intersection, but backstitch to secure. Add the next piece, holding the first piece out of the way. Stitch together in the same manner, sewing to the intersection and backstitching to secure. Do not press seams until the unit is complete. It may be necessary to press seams open to distribute the bulk of the seam allowance.

The pattern for last month's Primitive Americana quilt block included both curved piecing and inset seams.

We hope you give these methods a try, and if for some reason they do not work for you, please call Cat for a second option with no curves.



Rachel adds a fun and spunky element to the guild, and we are happy to get to know her a little bit better!






<< KARI GIACALONE

n July, I had the opportunity to travel through part of the USA with my sister. She was on a cross country trip, and I flew to Baltimore to meet her and drive home. We spent two days touring Washington, D.C. as fast as we could, to learn about the history of our country before heading for home. We mostly slept at KOA campgrounds in the back of my sister's pickup, unless the heat and humidity were just unbearable, then we opted for a hotel a night or two. We traveled the back roads most of the way, just to see what America was really like. A few of the places we visited were Gatlinburg and Nashville, TN, the "Precious Moments Chapel" in Carthage, MO (hundreds of Precious Moments dolls), Branson (which did not really impress me), the convergence of the huge Ohio and Mississippi Rivers, and Paducah, the quilting capital of the USA. We went to the quilt museum and also spent some time at Hancock's Warehouse, which I would not recommend. It was just a warehouse. We then visited the largest outdoor retail store, "Bass Pro", in Springfield, MO. We did not visit that many quilt stores, but there are three that I would like to report on and should be a must-see if you are ever in those areas. "The Cherry Pit," which was featured in last year's Quilt Sampler. It is located in

Sevierville, TN. The store had great displays, a very friendly staff, and lots of nice things. "The Button Hole" is about thirty miles off I-70 near McPherson, KS. This has been my favorite store so far of all the stores I've ever visited. It was such a happy, well-lit, friendly and cheerful store, with over-15,000 bolts of fabric. My sister liked Keepsake Quilting in NH, which I have always wanted to see, but said she liked the Button Hole better! This store was featured in the 2003 Quilt Sampler. We discovered a small store that just recently opened in Crossville, TN, right off the freeway; the "Little Blessings Quilt Shop." The owner did an excellent job of displaying her fabrics according to colors, designs, etc. This is the store where she showed us how to cover a roll of toilet paper with fabric. I am now on my way to the Seattle area for a family reunion and I plan on visiting some more quilt stores. I would like to visit Connecting Threads in Vancouver, WA, and also Sisters, OR. I plan to go see the Buggy Barn, near the Spokane area on the way back home. Call my cell phone if you need anything: 435-671-0263 (Editor's note: OK, Barbara, we are so jealous!)
