She brought several projects she has designed and made, and her talent in this area was evident. The project we learned on was a sunflower "wall pocket". You fill it with dried flowers or wheat, and have a darling decoration. I did spot one on someone's front door a few days after quilt guild, and it sure looked cute! Great job on finishing it! We'd love to see how everyone's turned out, so please bring them to show and tell this month if you've finished.

Just a few tips Amy shared...

- * use freezer paper to transfer your pattern to your wool
- * you can use most any stitch you'd like to applique with (she loves the whip stitch, simple and cute!)
- * Glad "press 'n seal" can be used to transfer a lettering pattern to your wool
- * use embroidery floss to applique with
- * the difference between wool and wool felt is the durability. Wool is woven and felt is "pressed" together.



We tried to visit Pendleton Mills on our way through Oregon, but it was not open for tours that week, so we stopped at a cute quilt store there in Pendleton.

Pieceable Dry Goods (A top 10 quilt shop in Better Homes & Gardens1998) in Kennewick, Washington, The Quilt Store (small, but clean and bright) in Anacortes, and Cotton Pickins (One of the top 10 shops featured in the current fall issue) in Stanwood, Columbia Basin Quiltworks in Moses Lake, and another shop in Woodinville were a few of the other shops we visited. I found fall fabric that I just loved at Cotton Pickins.

On the way back home, we drove the long way toward Spokane, just so I could visit *The Buggy Barn*. It was the highlight of all the quilt stores on the trip. It is located south of Spokane about 25 miles in the middle of

nowhere, sitting in the middle of a big wheat sarm on hundreds of acres. You leave the main road, go down a gravel road for about a mile, and there it is! A farm sitting atop a hill all by itself. The store really is an old buggy barn, converted into a small store. They have added a small lean-to, just to make it larger. I went up for a peek in a classroom, and the teacher and students all invited me to come in and join them. I did not want to leave, the atmosphere was so inviting. Everyone at this establishment was so friendly, and the place was booming with customers.

On the other side of Spokane is a large Buck Knife factory. We spent a lot of time there, it was very interesting. If you ever find yourself near the Spokane area, send your husband to the Buck Knife factory while you go visit the Buggy Barn.

We traveled back home through Montana and Idaho, including a new store for me in Idaho Falls, *The Quilted Daisy*. This is a quaint little store full of fun projects. The owner grew up with the ladies of the Buggy Barn!

Charity Quilt Corner


couple of years ago, we started a wall hanging to honor the Children's
