They invite merchants to donate materials, then measure and cut fabric and batting into kits, then send some home with guild members (we have the easy part in sewing the border edge), then have the FFA tie the quilts. Debbie delivers all of the quilts back and forth until the finished product is ready. If some quilts don't get done, she will even finish them herself. After all of these years, it has gotten so soft with wear and washing. I had to take it off of my son's bed this fall and patch it up in quite a few places before it could be washed and used again!

It is really a small thing but will matter to somebody in a big way by March as the blankets are delivered. Since "many hands make light work", let's not save any for Debbie to sew. She has already done her part!
