President's Message


What a year it's been! I can't believe we are already in December. I hope that everyone will have a great holiday and get a chance to quilt often.



Fran McGrath was born and raised in

Edinburgh, Scotland. She finished



high school at age 15 and began working. Some of her early jobs include a chicken processing plant, a brewery (she did paperwork) and a punch-card operator at an insurance company. She was married in 1970, and moved to South Africa, where her two daughters, Shonna and Claire were born. She moved to Utah in 1985, and lived in Park City. She lived in Wisconsin for five years, then came back to Utah a few years ago. Fran obtained her American citizenship on March 17, 2008. She now works full time for an Aerospace company in Salt Lake City.

She would like to learn everything there is to do with quilting. Have you finished a UFO? Please bring it for Sew & Tell!



Every quilter has them: UFOs— UnFinished Objects taking up physical space in the sewing room and mental space that most busy quilters can ill afford to spare. Here is another good trick you can use to insure projects get done!

First get a tote bag, plastic box or bin. Even if you have twenty, buy a new one. People tend to have a particular style running through all of the items they own. Buy one that is not your usual style. It won't blend into the crowd. In this way you will be able to locate it quickly.

Put everything you need for your project in this bag or box. Include scissors, thread, pattern, fabric, or any other equipment or materials you might need. Even include a pair of reading glasses if you use them for detail work.

Now comes the hard part. You cannot use

the items in this kit for anything else. Need a pair of scissors? Make sure there is another pair available. The same goes for everything else in your kit. Never remove anything from it unless you are working on this particular project.

Place your tote in a place where it is handy at a moment's notice. If you are one of those people that can't work on just one project, not to worry. Put more than one project in your kit so you can switch off when you need to.

When you are completely done with your UFO, assemble everything you need to work on the next one...
