The purpose of the Design Challenge is to go beyond the printed pattern you find in the guilt shop, the magazine, book Instructions...March / Challenge Quilt Show...May) or online. It is a time to challenge yourself to design your own quilt. Best of all, Design Challenge is for quilters of all skill levels; from the newest beginner to the more experienced quilter. So no matter your perceived skill level, you can participate in the

challenge and have a great time. Everyone will receive a participation prize at our Design Challenge Quilt Show at guild meeting in May! (First Instructions...February / Last

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Exercise the creative mind. The adage of "use it or lose it" is real. Creativity, whether it is in writing, painting, quilting, dance, or even welding is something that flows within you. You must keep it fluid or like the cold of winter, it will freeze up. Practice your creativity often and you will be rewarded with beautiful works of art that will bring you much joy. When you reach a certain point of total flow, you will know.

I read once in a fantasy series about some magicians that focused on a flame. When they focused on the absolute center of that flame they had found the center of their source of magic and could tap into it. The actuality was that it was not an outside source. The ability was within them all along, they merely needed to focus on something they saw as tangible when they learned. The flame would only take them so far. To really soar as a magician they needed to surpass the "crutch" and see the unlimited ability.

And that is what we need to do. Use the books, patterns, and other tools (The flame) and then start to reach out, feel the creativity within us and ... go with the flow. Eventually, we will find our creative pool and dive in. Use the creative imagery around you, tap into the underlying energy around you and create. Fabric is your medium. Break all the "rules" of quilting, gravity, and even quantum physics if it pleases you. Experiment with everything at your disposal. Bring facets and techniques from other art forms. Even visit the past to create something new.

But what about... Naysayers? Just tell them this; (somewhat of a quote from a movie I'm sure you know which one) Tomas Edison, when asked why he never gave up on inventing the light bulb with so many failures said... "I didn't fail. I learned 900 ways how not to make a light bulb. All I needed was to learn one way to make it."

That is so true. Creativity is not about getting it right the first time. It's about riding the wave of HOW it feels being in the middle of it. It's about enjoyment. It's about you... tapping into the elements within, the planet and the universe and .. Creating. In the end, you may have 900 UFOs in the closet and one truly stunning work of art that makes others drop to their knees and cry with the sheer beauty of it. The clouds will part and the angels will sing. Because you never gave up. Then, later on you will have an epiphany and bring out all the other UFOs and find the creativity flowing in just the right way seeing exactly how you want to finish them. Some days, some quilts are just not meant to be made. Wait and the day will come.

Finishing Bee

Bethany May is heading up a fun, new group: Finishing Bee. Scheduled to meet after guild meeting following the Round Robin Bee, here are guidelines:

- To join, contribute one fat quarter to the pool.
- Make a list of 10 projects you want to finish throughout the year.
 These can be works in progress, or new projects (write "New Project" on your list) List them in any order you'd like.
- Bring a copy of your list to the Finishing Bee, where Bethany will keep it on file, then keep a copy for yourself for inspiration.
- Each month Bethany will draw a number, and you will work on that project from your numbered list.
 The project number to complete by February guild meeting: #4 (In essence, choose whatever

- project you'd like to begin with and write it on line #4)
- Return the following month with your completed project and put your name in the drawing for the fat quarters.
- If you don't complete your project on time, it's a "BUMBLE" BEE the penalty is to contribute another fat quarter to the kitty.
 - Everyone will receive one FREE BEE at February's guild meeting. At any point you can make one substitution (switch projects) for any reason using your FREE BEE.
- If you have not used your FREE BEE by the end of the year, return it for another chance in the drawing.
- The final drawing will be held at the Christmas Social in December.

Set reasonable goals. If all you have to do to complete a project is add a label, make several! If your project will take longer than one month to complete, give it two spots, or whatever seems reasonable. Bethany plans to make a large quilt and will spread it out over two or three slots: Piecing, Quilting, Binding.

In April and September—the months prior to our retreats—Bethany will draw out two numbers, and you will have two months to complete both projects.

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Round Robin Bee

Round Robin exchange group is an exciting and challenging adventure. You supply the center block, and three other quilters in the group will each add a border to it. Your initial block will become a beautiful wall hanging or table topper. In turn, you will be designing and adding borders to three other little quilts.

Round Robin Bee will be held after guild meeting following *Sew & Tell*. The schedule is as follows: February: Meet to discuss rules, decide on center block size.

March: Round 1—Bring your Center Block for the initial exchange. Receive someone else's block to add the first border.

April: Round 2—Return Round 1 block with first border added, give to Cat to exchange for someone else's.

May: Round 3—Return Round 2 quilt with second border added; exchange again. This time you will have two months to add the final border—no RR Bee in June due to Guild Retreat.

July: Round 4—Return Round 3 with final border added for the big reveal, return to original owners! Yeah!
