Cat Beckstead, an accomplished quilter for 20 years, was raised under her Grandma's quilt frames. She served as president for the first three years (2/99 to 12/2001). Cat has a huge library of quilt publications, and is always willing to share her expertise. 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Friendship Block Exchange Bees

The Friendship Block Swap is a great way to try a lot of different patterns and increase your quilting skills, but most of all, to HAVE FUN!

Each participant will complete one block for each of the other members of your Friendship group of about six to eight people. Beginning in February, the first person on the list will provide a pattern and detailed instructions for everyone in the group, and you will have until the following guild meeting to finish the block. Each person in the group will take their turn respectively.

At the end of the swap you should have enough blocks for a wall hanging or small quilt, depending on the size of your block.. Or, you may want to use the friendship blocks to supplement an existing quilt or project. Or, if you

already have enough projects of your own, and are not sure you want to join a Friendship group, sign up anyway, and select a simple block design. your quilt and donate it to a charity of your choice.

First, decide on a block you would like to have made by each of the participants in your group. KEEP IT SIMPLE! No appliqué unless your group as a whole decides differently. Obtain or design a pattern. There are many websites that offer free quilt block patterns.



Next, determine your color and fabric choices. Provide clear and detailed instructions. If you prefer a specific fabric, you may wish to supply it along with your instructions. Include a basic drawing, and make a sample of the block to clarify color and placement, etc.

Remember to complete blocks for others in a timely manner, and return or send the block to guild meeting the following month.

Bethany May is heading up a fun, new group: Finishing Bee. Scheduled to meet after guild meeting following the Round Robin Bee, here are guidelines:

- To join, contribute one fat quarter to the pool.
- Make a list of 10 projects you want to finish throughout the year. These can be works in progress, or new projects (write "New Project" on your list) List them in any order you'd like.
- Bring a copy of your list to the Finishing Bee, where Bethany will keep it on file, then keep a copy for yourself for inspiration.
- Each month Bethany will draw a number, and you will work on that project from your numbered list.
- Return the following month with your completed project and put



fat quarters.

- If you don't complete your project on time, it's a "BUMBLE" BEE the penalty is to contribute another fat quarter to the kitty.
 - Everyone will receive one FREE BEE at February's guild meeting. At any point you can make one substitution (switch projects) for any reason using your FREE BEE.
- If you have not used your FREE BEE by the end of the year, return it for another chance in the drawing.
- The final drawing will be held at the Christmas Social in December.

Set reasonable goals. If all you have to do to complete a project is add a label, make several! If your project will take

longer than one month to complete, give it two spots, or whatever seems reasonable. Bethany plans to make a large quilt and will spread it out over two or three slots: Piecing, Quilting, Binding.

In April and September—the months prior to our retreats—Bethany will draw out two numbers, and you will have two months to complete both projects.

If you would like to get together for a regular old "Quilting Bee" to work on your projects, the Conference Room at the Wasatch County Services building will be available from 6:00 to 9:00 pm on the FIRST Wednesday of each month. Call Debbie Proctor: 671-0249.

Round Robin exchange group is an exciting and challenging adventure. You supply the center block, and three or four other quilters in your bee will each take a turn designing and adding a border, rotating it to someone else the following month and so on. When it is returned, your initial block will have become a beautiful wall hanging or table topper.



Quilted Nametag

Make a quilted nametag to wear at guild functions.

Sew your favorite block in any size up to 5". Stitch a 1-1/2" strip of muslin or white fabric to one side of the block. This will be the place to embroider your Name, or use a Pigma Pen if you would like to write your name.

Cut a piece of batting and backing to the size needed. Lay right sides together and stitch around block, leaving an opening for turning.

Clip corners, turn right side out, handstitch the opening and attach a pin to the back. Your very own miniature quilt to wear with pride!


