Quilters working on the Lullaby project met together prior to guild to get their first instructions. We welcomed five new guild members that evening

Shantelle Cox presented a thorough lesson on quilt labels, answering all the questions: who, when, where, why and how. Every quilt has a story. Shantelle reminds us, "Always attach a quilt label to tell the story about the quilt when you are not there to tell it yourself." She discussed the latest and greatest products

available to make and print labels using your home computer and printer.

Cat Beckstead demonstrated the art of Needle-Turn Appliqué. County USU extension agent, Debbie Proctor, whose offices are down the hall, provided the overhead projection system for us to have an intimate view of Cat's technique.

Cindy teaches Seminary part-time at Wasatch High School. She also works with Deseret Book's "Time Out For Women" program; a fun, uplifting, spiritual seminar for LDS women. She gets to travel about twelve weeks out of the year to different parts of the country for these seminars. She loves this job and loves meeting people. Cindy also enjoys reading, being around youth, and being involved with her sports fanatic family in any aspect. She thoroughly loves quilting as it has meant so much to her.

Do not add more borders, and do not increase the size of the quilt by adding your appliqué.

June. Prizes this month were a finger pincushion kit along with appliqué pins and

needles.

Use your imagination. Think about your element of nature and how appliqué will work beautifully on your quilt.

COOL TRICKS

Deonn Stott showed us a cool way to make dimensional Flying Geese units with ONE SEAM!

Cut one rectangle and two squares using the Flying Geese Chart below for sizes.

Fold the rectangle in half, right side out. With fold at the top, sandwich between the two squares, aligning bottom edges.

Stitch at the right side of the folded
