What's New - MARCH GUILD MEETING

We will be privileged to welcome guest instructor and renowned quilter, Jodi Warner for our March guild meeting. She will present a trunk show of various bed-size quilts and wall hangings stitched over the past 20 years or so, including competition quilts, pattern models, free-lance published projects, and so forth. Discussion related to these quilts will include topics such as "what judges look for in award-winning quilts", and "tricks and techniques for excellence in quilting."

Jodi Warner was raised in the Holladay community southeast of Salt Lake City. She learned to sew at a young age. She received a B.A. degree in Textiles/ Fashion Design from Brigham Young University in 1978, and began designing and making costumes for a theatrical studio and gowns for a bridal shop. When Jodi began focusing on traditional patchwork and appliqué, she quickly realized she had found a design arena that offered endless challenges and rewards.

Jodi has lectured, conducted workshops, taught at quilt shops and mounted one-woman shows throughout the Intermountain West. Jodi's quilts have won local, regional and national honors, including several prestigious purchase awards. Her patterns, and articles about her work have appeared in many

magazines. She owns and operates her own pattern business, *Hearthsewn*, and has a continuing freelance relationship with major national publisher *House of White Birches* for which she began designing in 1996. She has contributed to many of their quilting project books, with several completely authored by her. Notable among these are four in the "Illustrated Guide To:" series. Two titles by Jodi being released by HWB in 2007 are "A Year of Flower Blocks" and "Autumn Tartan." Jodi will have several of her books and patterns available for purchase at guild meeting.

Many of Jodi's best quilting memories have come with her role as instructor, sharing with students what she has learned and developed. She currently is a featured teacher at Quilts, Etc., in Sandy, Utah, and guest teacher at other shops. A separate ongoing interest centers around a collection of her quilts paired with children's picture books, which she uses to promote the two themes of family literacy and quiltmaking awareness.

Jodi designs and stitches at her homebased studio in South Jordan, Utah, near her husband Vince, who also works in his office at home. She has a married daughter, two teenage sons, and one grand-son.

Queen Bee - KayeDawn Epps

KayeDawn was born in Logan, Utah, five weeks early while her parents were helping to bring in the fall crops on her grandparent's dairy farm in Cache Valley. She grew up in the Ogden area and lived in Utah all her life. She once went on a blind date with her best friend's date's best friend. She fell in love at first sight (killer blue eyes) and they eloped to Elko, Nevada later that year, and as she says, they have been on an adventure ever since.

She attended Weber State after high school, but put her education on hold for the next 25 years to raise her family. She graduated from UVSC with a degree in business management the same year her daughter graduated from high school. She and her husband Richard have four sons, one daughter and five grandchildren. KayeDawn currently works at Fort Douglas Army Reserve Unit, and will retire in two years. Then she can spend her time building her longarm machine quilting

business called "Mountain Home Machine Quilting."

KayeDawn has been sewing since she was about seven years old when she received a sewing machine as a gift. She made her first quilt in high school, and her mother called in the neighbor ladies to quilt it. Her mother taught her how to sew, and she made most of her own clothing, and later her children's clothing, including all the jeans for her boys. She is continuing the sewing legacy by giving her granddaughters sewing machines of their own, and teaching them to sew.



Design Challenge 2007 - Charm School

Charm School will resume class next week on Thursday, March 1st.

COURSE 2:

What is Black and White and Red all over? Your fabric, of course. Bring two sets of squares, selecting prints that are black and white, red and white, or black and red. There can not be any other colors in the prints. Make sure you select black and not really dark navy blue or green. Make sure you select a true white and not off-white, ecru, cream, antique white, etc. Select a shade of red that can not be considered magenta or pink. Black, white and red are the only colors allowed this month.

DETENTION: This class is for all those who were unprepared last month, i.e. forgot to bring your fabrics, or missed last month's class. Bring your two sets of squares for "I Can Sing a Rainbow" to Detention (to be held after Charm School) and those in Detention will swap squares with each other. Detention requirements: Bring two sets of 12 - 6" squares of colorful, multicolored prints. No tone-on-tone prints. No white or black backgrounds. No solid fabrics. There is NO guarantee that you will go home with 24 different fabrics. The only guarantee is that you will not go home with the exact 24 squares you came with.

For those who are seeking EXTRA CREDIT (you were in class last month but want more fabrics), you may bring two new sets to swap in Detention; just follow the guidelines for last month's class.

CHARM SCHOOL RULES:

- Use only 100% cotton, quilt shop quality fabric. No fabrics from JoAnn's or Wal-Mart.
- 2. Do not pre-wash your fabric.
- 3. Cut fabric accurately and carefully.
- 4. One set = 12 6" squares. A 1/3 yard cut or 2 fat quarters is enough fabric to cut one set of squares.
- 5. Each set must be a different fabric.

April: "Choir Practice" (fabrics that sing)
May: "Study Hall" (layout and design)
June: "Final Exams" (quilt show)

Remember, everyone is encouraged to participate in charm school. The more the merrier! If you are unable to come to guild meetings, please give your sets of squares to another guild member so you can be included in the trade. By April you should have 72 six-inch squares to make your charm quilt.

QUILTING TIPS by Mary Walther

Tired of getting tired hands and shoulders when machine quilting at home? Just apply a little rubber cement or stencil "tack it over again" spray onto your fingers. Allow it to dry before quilting, and you will be surprised how easily you can grip the fabric and quilt without strain.

Choosing fabrics for a quilt can be a

challenge sometimes. Make it easier on yourself by choosing a main fabric with many colors. On the selvage edge, along with the name of the company and print, there will also be colored circles, which are the colors used in the printing of the fabric. Use these colors to help you pick your accent fabrics. I still do this, even after years of quilting.
