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In Review - GETTING TO THE "POINT"


A big THANK YOU to Rachel and Deonn for Getting us to the POINT last guild meeting. Here is Rachel's magical formulas for calculating SIDE SETTING TRIANGLES: Finished Size x 1.414 + 1.25 = Size of block to cut diagonally twice

And CORNER TRIANGLES:

Finished Size \div 1.414 + .875 = Size of block to cut diagonally for corners.

Cutting your setting squares in this manner will allow the straight grain to follow the outside edge of the quilt, making your quilt lie flatter when setting your blocks "on Point".

Deonn gave a demonstration on applying mitered or picture-frame borders. Measure your quilt just as you would to add straight borders - once through the middle, then two more locations to get the average. Then instead of adding one border at a time, sew your border strips together, measure, then cut your mitered corners all at once.



Pre-cut borders before attaching them to achieve beautiful miters every time.


Block of the Month

Please refer to your 9-PATCH CUTTING CHART in your Quilter's Bible for the cutting dimensions of each unit for the size of block you wish to make.

From "Quilt Me a Story" by Susan Meeske

The pattern selected by the quilter can be indicative of a quilter's lifestyle, artistic talents, political views, and even his or her emotions.

Prior to a woman's ability to vote, some women used their artistic talents and expressed their political views through a quilt. The issue of slavery in the United States in the mid-1800s led to quilt patterns called Slave Chain or Underground Railroad.

The American Quilt: A History of Cloth and Comfort 1750-1950, by Roderick Kiracofe, tells how, during the Civil War, the Sanitary Commission collected approximately 250,000 quilts that were distributed among soldiers in the Union Army. One can think about the tremendous sacrifice that some of these women made in order to contribute to the war effort. Money, food, and fabrics were scarce, and frequently women

were in charge of the household and farms while their sons and husbands were participating in the war. Yet almost one-quarter of a million quilts were made by these women.

Friendship quilts were extremely popular throughout the United States from the mid- to late 1870s. Friendship quilts were used to capture the story of friendships and they contained either individual patchwork squares, each done by a woman's friends, or muslin squares inscribed with handwritten poems or sayings on them, each dated and signed by the maker.

Friendship quilts captured the history of the women who made them and the kinship that bound them together. Because of the lack of standing that women had in society, a friendship quilt was frequently the only record that substantiated a woman's existence.
