

Block of the Month

This month's variation on a nine-patch is the FRIENDLY HANDS

Please refer to your 9-PATCH CUTTING CHART in your Quilter's Bible for the cutting dimensions of units A & B for the size of block you wish to make. See chart below for E. For this quilt, reverse the colors of the center row for your sashing rows, creating a secondary pattern:

Quilt Me a Story

"Quilting Bees" by Susan Meeske

Quilting bees are unique to America and became important social gatherings for women. Quilting bees enabled women to meet and discuss politics, religion, and health, and it empowered them to socialize and express themselves without the influence of men.

The book Huskings, Quilting, and Barn Raisings: Work-Play Parties in Early America, by Victoria Sherrow, details the events of the quilting bees. Sherrow notes that most quilting bees started early in the morning and usually occurred in the winter. Sometimes seven or eight quilts would be completed during the bee. While the mothers quilted and exchanged gossip with their neighbors, older children were called upon to thread needles and trim threads, or they tore strips of rags for rug making. The women spent the majority of the day quilting, but by nightfall, the men and boys would arrive. Supper would be served and fiddle music, dancing, and games followed shortly thereafter.

KayeDawn's trick for keeping her bobbins from losing their string is to use a piece of 1/2" plastic tubing and cut a slice just large enough to go on a bobbin, with a slit in the side. No more thread tails!

Fons & Porter use sticky gauze for the same idea. You know the colored gauze you get when giving blood? It sticks to itself, just cut a strip and wrap a little around your spools or bobbins to secure those loose threads.
