
Quilting in 3-D

Lose Weight Quilting - Step Aerobics Keep you rotary mat, rulers, and cutter atop the refrigerator. Use a step stool to climb up every time you need to cut. Place the stool in front of the refrigerator so you can't open it.

The top of the refrigerator is just right for rotary-cutting. Stand on tippy-toes to strengthen calf muscles as you cut.

We will have some more quilts on frames before our next meeting. Please try to be there at 6:30 so we can have them finished before the meeting starts. Happy Quilting!


Friendship Block

We will be getting the assignments for our Friendship groups at guild meeting this month. Cat will be calling those people that will need to have their patterns ready to distribute that night. Remember our guidelines as you're thinking about a pattern.

- I. Have fun
- 2. Choose the block you'd like; get or design a pattern KEEP IT SIMPLE!
- 3. Determine color, fabric style, size, etc.
- 4. Type up clear and precise instruction
- 5. Make a sample block for your group to see
- 6. Complete blocks for others in a timely manner (or it's no fun)
- 7. Don't forget to HAVE FUN!



Row Quilt Block of the Month



Print A: Four 2" squares

Print B: Four 2" x 3.5"

Background (bkgrd): Four 2" Squares

Background: Four 2" x 3.5"

In order to get the "Two" spin wheels make sure that Print A and Print B are contrasting. The background fabric should not steal the show. Something subtle that compliments the two prints.

If you are making the row quilt you need \neq blocks and 2 half blocks. For the half blocks don't sew that final seam down the center.

I visited the following shops in Idaho on Feb. 10th and have the following information to report.

The Gathering Place - 524 6th Street Rupert, ID

(center of town next to the park)

This is the largest quilt store in Idaho. It is in a Very old, but restored building, pretty big. They stated they have over 8,000 bolts of fabric. The staff was Very nice to evertone. They said if we wanted to come as a group, let them know and they will abve refreshments for us and give us a tour. I found a coupon in the Gountry Register Flyer and received a 20% discount off of y entire order. It took us about three hours to get to this store from Heber, about 225 miles. I could have spent several more hours here.

Karleen's Fabrics and Grafts Heyburn, ID

Not much here, but a very nice lady.

Stitchin: Time - 129 Main Avenue West Twin Falls, ID

This is a nice smaller store in the older section of downtown. If you are in the area, stop in, but I would not make a trip to see it. They have lots of batiks and solid colors.
