# Bonnie Miles ~ "Free" Quilts

Editor's note: This emailed letter is a great introduction of our guest instructor for this month's guild meeting, Bonnie Miles. Sure hope everyone will be able to attend!

One of the things I hate about teaching is to have to "toot my own horn" !!!! But just because you asked, I will give you a little background on me and the workshop.

My love for quilts and quilting goes back a very long way - to when I watched my grandmother and her friends quilt. I was pretty certain, after I was married and a poor school teacher's wife, that I could make one too... out of scraps that I had on hand. That first pieced quilt wasn't so bad, but I used every single thing available - and today it's quite a piece to behold. The red wool ran and shrank when washed, and the part rayon piece frayed away at the seams, etc. But it has been loved and used to death I And besides that, it was FREEI Hahl Little did I know that I was starting a trend - Free Quilts!

I have always loved to sew, and for all of my life as a mother of young children (and even older ones) I made all their clothes, and mine as well. I taught sewing for Jordan District Adult Education for years, and tried every new technique that came along. Then, in about 1972, I renewed my passion for quilting. At this time, the quilting craze had not hit the general population, and finding appropriate quilting fabrics was not easy. But from about then, until the early 1980's, I plugged away at it, and made a few quilts. As you can imagine, when quilt magazines started to be published, and fabric shops started catering to quilters, I was in heaven.

So, at that time, I started quilting in earnest. Now my love of quilting takes me all sorts of directions. I have incorporated it into my travel business, and conduct tours that focus on both historical culture and quilting. I organize, orchestrate and teach at the Winter Quilt Retreat at Bryce Canyon. (14 years now!) I teach for anyone that asks - and have done so for many years around the intermountain area. My aim is not to force quilters to make a specific project as much as to teach them good techniques. It's sort of like the old adage of "teach a man to fish..." idea. I believe that when we learn a technique well, it opens up all sorts of avenues for us to create and design our OWN projects. To me, that spells success.

With that in mind, I have come up with many great workshops (near 20 now) using a variety of great techniques. The FREE QUILT idea came when I looked at my growing number of leftover pieces, and thought that they certainly still had purpose and worth. Thus, I began planning ways to use them - for after all, they were free, weren't they? So - that's the lead in statement for the FREE QUILTS workshop. Using what you have - and making something beautiful. Come and see what we can create!

And yes - I am a wife, mother of five and grandmother of 18. I own and operate American Heritage Tours, work in church in the Relief Society and at the Mt. Timpanogos Temple, and in my spare time, I stitch. See you next week.


